The key themes for our meeting in Prince George include Emergency Management, Clean BC, and the Balancing of Social and Economic Prosperity. For each topic, a keynote speaker will provide context and to set the stage for a panel presentation featuring mayors.

We will have a facilitator who will be summarizing deliberations in order to identify potential resolutions for the fall UBCM conference. Prior to attendees departing at noon on April 2, we will provide delegates with the opportunity to inform these recommendations.

Prince George is getting ready to be your host and is happy to provide more information on two of our Keynote Speakers, and our facilitator.

KIMBERLEY NEMRAVA is the Former VP – BC and Yukon for the Canadian Red Cross Society. Originally from Winnipeg, Manitoba, she first came west as part of the inaugural class at Lester B. Pearson College of the Pacific. She went on to be the first female to work on a Canadian Coast Guard search and rescue unit.

With this background in water safety, first aid and lifesaving, Kimberley joined the Red Cross more than 25 years ago and has held positions in First Aid, Water Safety, Communications and Management.

Kimberley is a graduate of the University of Victoria (B.Sc. Biology) and Royal Roads University (M.A. Leadership and Training). In her spare time, she visits hospitals, care homes and schools with her therapy dog, Sophie, through the Pacific Animal Therapy Society. She is passionate about working with people to help others.

Kimberley will provide her insights on the needs and tools available to modernize BC's Emergency Management systems and current best practices being used in BC communities.



SHAUNA SYLVESTER has a unique urban and rural perspective of B.C. She was born in Nelson, spent her summers in Penticton, her youth in Coquitlam, New Westminster, Burnaby and Nanaimo and raised her family in Vancouver.

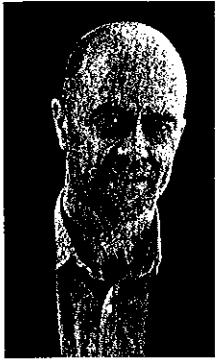
She has a deep commitment to social, economic and environmental issues. She was hired by SFU to strengthen the university's relationship with the community through the SFU Public Square and the Morris J. Wosk Centre for Dialogue, where she serves as the Executive Director and as a Professor of Professional Practice in the faculty of arts and social sciences.

Shauna is a social entrepreneur. She is a founder of Renewable Cities, Carbon Talks, Canada's World and IMPACS - the Institute for Media, Policy and Civil Society, and has served as a board member of Mountain Equipment Cooperative, Vancity Credit Union, and the BC Assessment Authority. She currently serves as the Chair of Tamarack, a Canadian organization that supports local communities in addressing social and economic development.

Shauna is a fierce advocate for democracy and supports local governments in their citizen engagement work. She ran for mayor of Vancouver as an independent and is currently supporting Mayor Hurley of Burnaby by facilitating his Task Force on Community Housing and working with the Mayors' Council and key transportation stakeholders in Metro Vancouver convening "Moving in a Livable Region" which explores transportation and land use planning. Shauna's commitment to bringing diverse groups together to build trust and address pressing social, economic and environment issues spans 30 years and dozens of countries. She was an organizer for Canada for the Beijing Women's Conference and the Rio Summit; she wrote the first Women and AIDS resource guide and worked on reconstruction efforts in Afghanistan, Cambodia, and Sri Lanka.

Shauna will set the context for a discussion about how municipalities can and do respond to the need for both economic and social development.





CAM MCALPINE is a Principal at Earncliffe Strategy Groups and has an extensive background in the media industry complemented by broad communications experience at all three levels of government as well as in the private sector. Cam has become a recognized expert and trusted adviser to executive and senior management, with specific experience in the practice areas of strategic communications planning, issues management, crisis communications, stakeholder engagement and community relations.

Cam has supported government and Crown agencies through contentious policy and regulatory processes, provided primary communications and stakeholder engagement support on some of the largest public capital projects in British Columbia, shepherded three health authorities through sensitive stakeholder engagement and change management processes, and worked with local governments and First Nations on citizen engagement and community relations initiatives. Cam has also provided strategic counsel to the private sector and is one of the most respected advisers to the Canadian forest industry.
